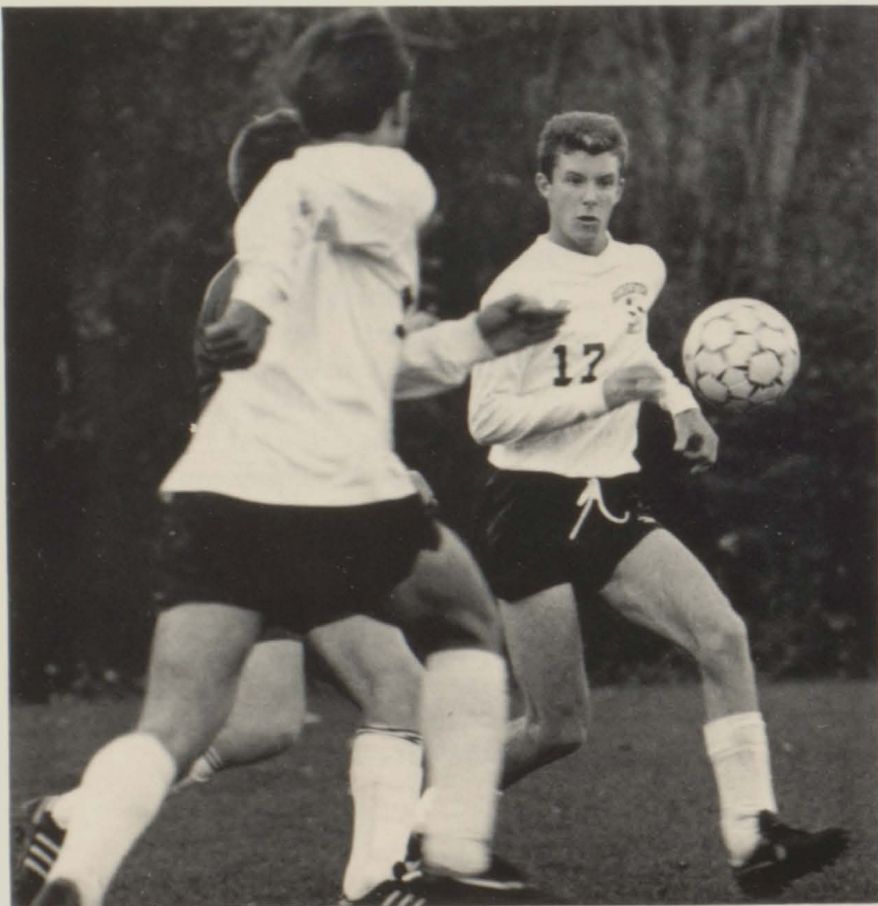

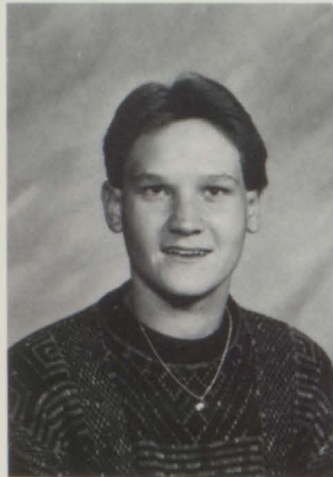

MR. ALLEN

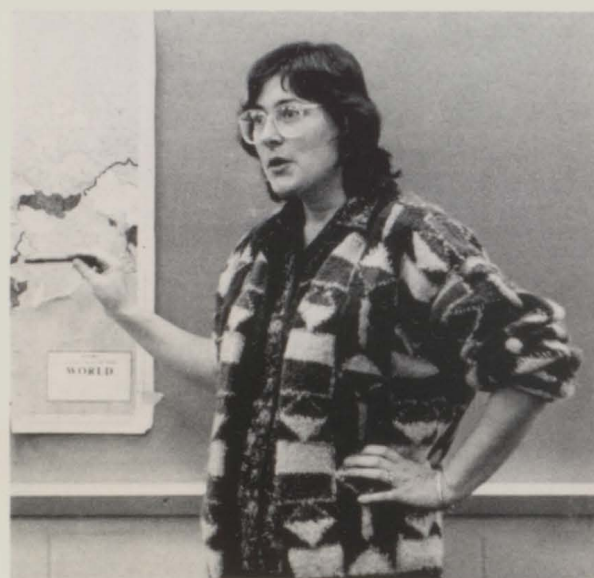

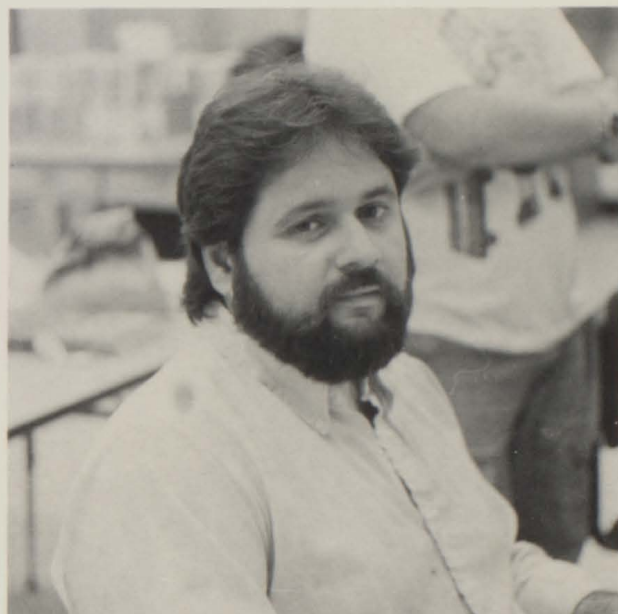

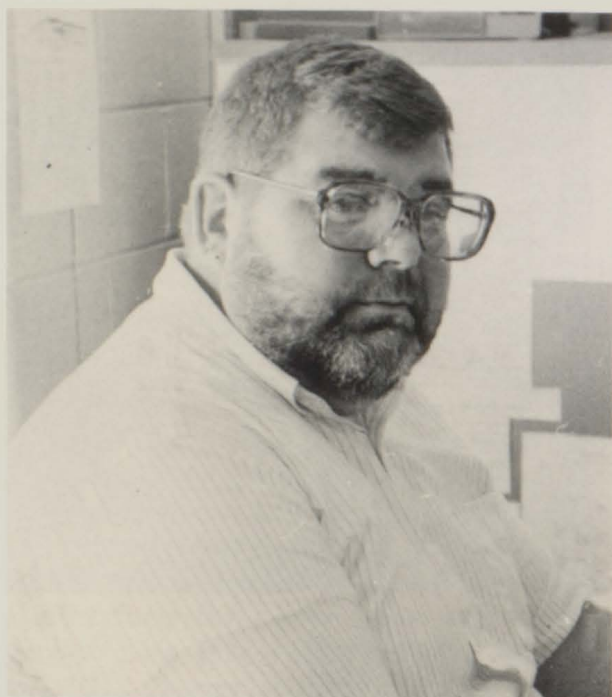

MR. SCHULZE

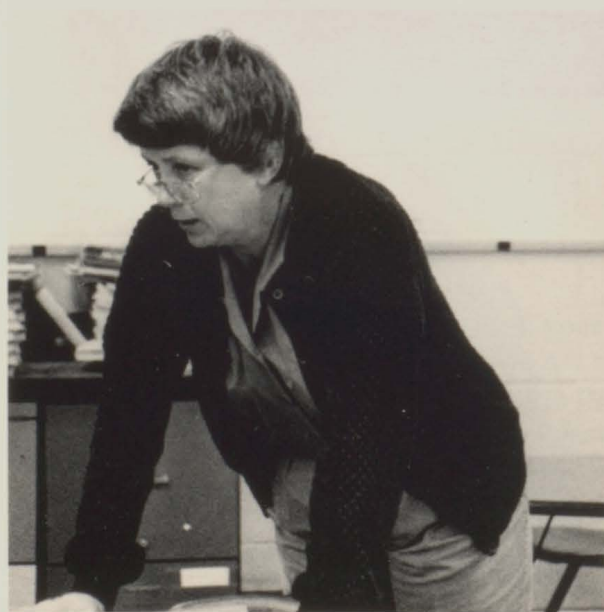

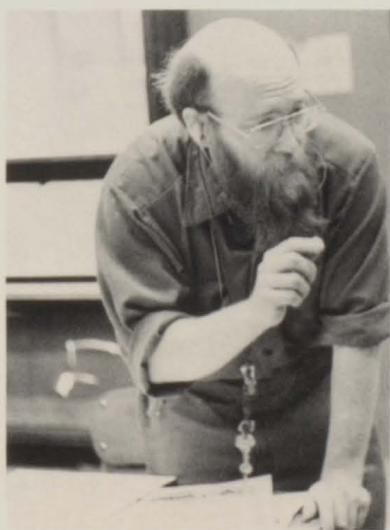

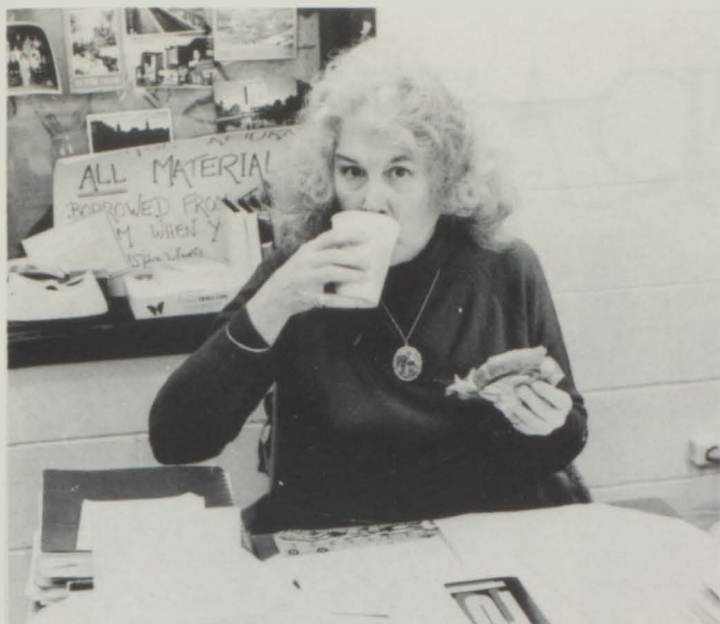

MRS. COLLINS

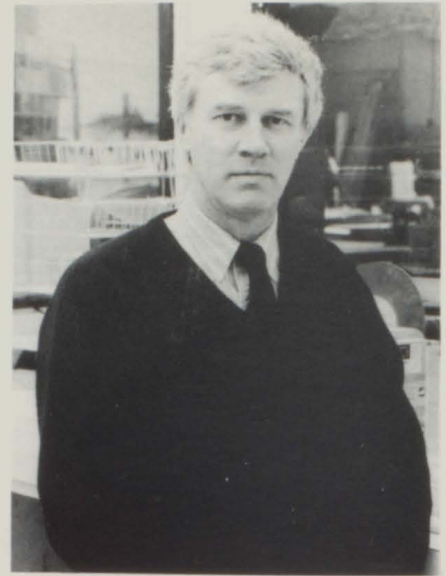

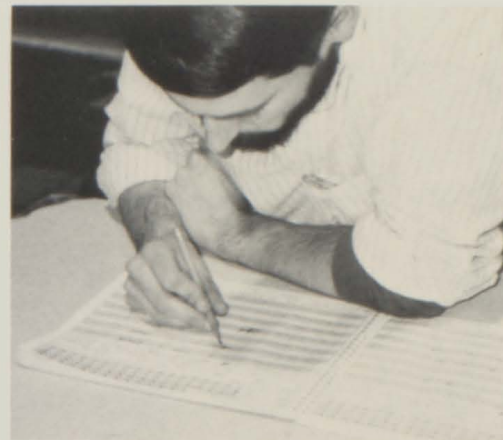
